Bill Thomson, Marshall Cavendish

An incredible wordless picture book comes to life when children find a bag of chalk at the park and begin to draw. Each illustration is meticulously painted by hand. The magic chalk will surprise all "readers" who can create their own words with the story.

Seed Soil Sun Cris Peterson

This book has vibrant photographs with lots of details for children to see. It opens with hands showing a wide variety of seeds. We then watch corn grow. This book complements science curricula and demonstrates where food actually comes from rather than just the grocery store.

How Rocket Learned to Read

Tad Hills

A little, yellow bird is determined to get a dog named Rocket to read. This story allows the readers to see and hear the progress of reading. It reminds us that everything takes time. This book makes learning to read very appealing.

Banana Ed Vere

Comical illustrations paired with two keywords, *banana* and *please*, provide a message about sharing. The banana-colored cover featuring a bug-eyed, all-arms-and-tail monkey provides a humorous, attractive backdrop for exploring appropriate times to shout and to use kind words.

City Dog, Country Frog

Mo Williems, III, Jon J. Muth

A country frog befriends a city dog that is new to the country. They go through the seasons together sharing each other's games. In winter, country frog doesn't return. City dog carries on the tradition with a new country friend.

If You're A Monster and You Know It

Rebecca and Ed Emberley

This is a delightful parody of "If You're Happy and You Know It" in which children are invited to snort, growl, smack, stomp, twitch, wiggle, and roar.

Let's Save the Animals

Frances Barry

The semi-elliptical shape of this book and gorgeous collages of animals in their habitat, interspersed with facts and action-oriented text, perfectly combine to present animal protection and activism to young children. Several child-centered activism activities found at the end of the book are helpful for exploring the interconnectedness of our world.

Taking Care of Mama

Mitra Modarressi

A raccoon family tells the sick mother to stay in bed while they take care of the house. They realize taking care of a family is hard work. Children will enjoy the story's humor and simple rhymes.

The Buffalo Are Back

Jean Craighead George

Incorporating history and environmental awareness, we learn what happens when the prairie environment is decimated and nearly all buffalo are killed. A herd of 300 buffalo survive to begin the renewal of the Tallgrass Prairie Preserve, a protected patch of land, in Kansas. Thanks to this assertive effort, there are more than 200,000 buffalo in existence today. Brilliant watercolor illustrations illustrate this story.

Stand Straight, Ella Kate

Kate Klise

This fictionalized picture book, told in first person, shows how one lady deals with being 8 feet tall. At a time when many young women had no opportunities to travel, Ella embraced her height and appeared in museums, exhibitions, traveling circus shows, and even a world's fair. This is an excellent choice for students who have to deal with being "different."

Heart-Stopping Roller Coasters

Meish Goldish

Hang on tight as you imagine yourself on the best roller coaster rides in the world. This engaging book in the World's Biggest series offers photos, statistics, a brief narrative, and suggested books and websites for further exploring amusement parks and roller coaster rides.

The Odious Ogre Norton Juster

Ogre has a terrible reputation. He easily devours anything or anyone in his path, until he meets someone who is kind to him. Children will enjoy the Ogre's adventures and will respond to the surprising way this bully is stopped.

Young Zeus G. Brian Karas

With a splash of humor, Karas simplifies volumes of Greek mythology surrounding the life of Zeus and his family into an interesting and captivating picture book. This book serves as a great place to begin exploration into the Greek gods.

Older Than the Stars

Karen C. Fox

Children will explore atoms, stars, planets, and the development of sea creatures and animal life on Earth while reading this cumulative rhyme. Fascinating illustrations enrich the text and help children understand the "big bang theory."

Henry's Aaron Dream

Matt Tavares

Lavish illustrations accompany this biography of baseball legend, Hank Aaron, from his days of playing sandlot ball to the Negro Leagues to the Atlanta Braves.

Lafayette and the American Revolution

Russell Freedman

The Marquis de Lafayette was just 19 years old when he defied his family and the king of France to come to the United States to join the patriots.

Shooting Kabul N.H. Senzai

Fadi's family flees to California from Taliban-ruled Afghanistan just prior to the September 11th attacks in New York City. Fadi must adapt to his new home and find a way to return to Afghanistan to retrieve his sister, who was accidentally left behind.

Palace Beautiful Sarah DeFord Williams

Two sisters and their new friend learn about the influenza epidemic of 1918 after they find a diary written by a girl who experienced it firsthand.

Blindsided Priscilla Cummings

Fourteen-year-old Natalie faces many hurdles as she deals with the fact that she is going blind. The book raises awareness about a population that is often overlooked. Students can relate to Natalie's situations and will be inspired by her courage.

The Dreamer Pam Muñoz Ryan

The Dreamer is a fictional story based on the childhood of the poet Pablo Neruda, a Nobel Peace prize winner. Just like the real Neruda, the main character in the story spends his days dreaming of the world.

The Grimm Legacy Polly Shulman

Elizabeth gets a job at a library that houses the magical Grimm collection. When objects from the library's collection start to disappear, Elizabeth and her coworkers must solve the crime. Magic combs, boots, and carpets alight in this fantasy novel.

The Red Pyramid Rick Riordan

Sadie and her brother Carter accompany their dad to the British Museum. Dad destroys the Rosetta Stone and disappears. Landing in a world of Egyptian gods, the kids learn to read hieroglyphics and find out that their task is to save humanity.
